Right place, right time: Neighborhood clinic provides a world of services

Most days, the small medical office in the converted shop class at Hoover High School looks as if it is in the heart of a struggling Third World nation.

Parents, mostly mothers, of all different colors and hues, come with their babies and young children. Many speak languages and wear distinctive garbs that immediately set them apart culturally.

Most often they seek services for their young: inoculations through immunization programs; dental care through the center's dental clinic.

Older kids, elementary school-age to adolescent, stream in to the Hoover Health and Social Services Center, too -- with and without their parents.

The younger ones generally need relief from one childhood illness or another, while the older ones seek counseling services and help coping with more complex problems related to social issues.

Workers who run the center, daily from 7:30 a.m. until 3:30 p.m., never forget that most of these patients come from poverty and struggle in the surrounding cultural stew pot that is City Heights .

Above all, for many of the patients, the center is their primary health care provider.

"There are 25 or more different cultures that come through here," says Pat Bently, Hoover's school nurse and nurse practitioner. "We have Chinese, Vietnamese, Africans, Mexicans ... all different people, and that requires the staff to always be culturally sensitive.

"And it can be almost like a main emergency room around here -- we never really know what's coming through that door ... But you have to be ready."

The Hoover Health and Social Service Center has always been up to the challenges, she adds.

It was born six years ago, primarily, through a collaboration between the school and Children's Hospital, amid an influx of refugees from a variety of struggling foreign nations, who were changing the face of City Heights.

School and hospital officials agreed such a center would be a vital resource for the

community.

The service center's primary goal is to provide medical and dental care, mental health services and health education free for all students at Hoover and its 11 feeder schools, says pediatrician Herbert Kimmons.

He and a rotating support staff of five from Children's help run the center, the only high school in the county, he says, with a school-based health center.

And, he adds, it is one of only a few such centers in the nation to offer dental care after Children's Dental Health Association opened the dental clinic two years ago.

Now about 10 different social service agencies collaborate, in one way or another, to running the center.

They help provide a range of services, including volunteer programs, through which Hoover students themselves help expand the center's outreach to peers and others in the community.

Clients can get information and referrals on everything from job opportunities to sources of emergency aid. They can get education on how to avoid smoking, alcohol and other drugs. And individual family and group counseling is available to those who need and want it. Center coordinator Mary Jo McCarey, a school counselor the past 19 years, says the operation's strongest asset is its ability to be a social service outreach to families through the students.

It makes a big difference, especially to adolescents and families struggling just to make ends meet, she says, adding: "I don't think many of these families or adolescents would try to access health care unless someone was right there -- spending the time, telling them about it."

The center does just that.

Among the most effective of the student outreach programs, McCarey says, is the center's Student Well-being Advocacy Program (SWAP).

Hoover juniors and seniors, interested in careers in health and human services fields, volunteer to get in-class training and then work in the program, mainly as peer counselors and health center representatives.

In those roles, they act as interpreters and otherwise assist families and students with limited English-speaking skills.

The volunteers also serve as mediators and counselors for fellow students on adolescent health issues. And they work as ambassadors within the community, spreading the word about the center through meetings, seminars and conferences.

Football star Willie Everett, a SWAP volunteer, attests to the multiple benefits he's received through his association with the center.

The 18-year-old senior says working to help his peers in need has greatly improved his own self-esteem, leaving him feeling that he is making a much-needed contribution to his community.

And the clinic has helped him help himself, too, at times.

Last year, when he and his girlfriend broke up, he says, "I was depressed I didn't know what to do," at first.

Willie soon recalled some of the advice that, as a SWAP volunteer, he imparts to others. And, eventually, he turned to the center for counseling. He and McCarey agree that helped get him back on track.

"I'm over it," Willie says. "And I feel much better now."

Such sentiment is good medicine for the Hoover center staff, letting them know they are reaching their goal to keep the families in this community healthy -- inside and out.
